


John Selman Roach April 10, 1908 - November 23, 1985

John S. Roach was a teacher and athletic coach at Glencoe High School from 1937 to 1971. His time at Glencoe was distinguished by the continuous introduction of new activities so as to engage and involve more people, both young and old, in wholesome and productive activity. In all things he was a teacher first. His main concern was not necessarily winning a competition but how participation in that competition built the character of the individual and that everybody had a chance to participate and find themselves. He exemplified honor, respect, integrity and dignity in his personal bearing and language making himself a role model to all who came in contact with him.

Born: April 10, 1908 Windber, Pennsylvania- son of professional baseball player Roxey Roach. Graduated from Windber High School in 1926 where he played football, basketball and baseball. Following high school he remained in the Windber area playing semi professional basketball and professional baseball briefly with the Mid Atlantic League.

In 1932, following the death of his grandparents, John went to Susquehanna University in Selinsgrove, Pennsylvania where he lettered in football, basketball and baseball. John played on Susquehanna's first undefeated football team in 1932. He graduated with a major in Education and minor in Social Studies in 1936. Following summer school at the University of Chicago, where he studied with Alonzo Stagg Sr., he served as Assistant Football Coach under A.A. Stagg Jr., who had come to Susquehanna the year before, and as the university's Head Baseball Coach. Additional study was done at Columbia University in New York in 1938 toward a major in Physical Education.

During the winter and summer of 1937 he studied at the University of Minnesota, coming to Glencoe on Bernie Bierman's recommendation in the fall of 1937 as coach of all sports and teacher of math and business relations.



The main accomplishments of this period include an undefeated and unscored on football team in 1937 and designing and laying out the new Allen Field Athletic Complex which was constructed in the summer of 1938 and first used that fall. The site included a football field with cinder track, baseball diamond and area with sand pits and runways for field events in addition to a football practice field. His 1940 basketball team won the district championship. (see won/lost record on following pages)

Entered Military service in March of 1943 at the conclusion of basketball season and returned to the classroom October 22, 1945 teaching Health and Boys Physical Education until 1967 when he switched to Jr. High Social Studies.

Note: It is assumed that he coached all sports before the war but there is no evidence of activity in baseball or track. It doesn't appear in faculty lists as being coached by anyone nor does it appear on contracts or in the newspaper accounts of high school sports, which were very thorough. There is late spring and summer coverage in the Enterprise of what appears to be town team or legion baseball but his name is not associated with it. The status of high school baseball and track is unknown and may not have held the same position as football and basketball, which were covered in depth on a weekly basis with front page stories. His personal scrapbooks contain materials on football and basketball for those years but nothing on baseball or track.

Won/Lost record for the five years as coach prior to WWII

Football: 27 wins 5 losses 3 ties (1937: Undefeated and Unscored On)

Basketball: 57 wins 20 losses (1940: Won District Championship)

John entered military service in March of 1943 and served his country at Fort Benning, Ga. where he was in charge of the recreational component of a unit that worked with the rehabilitation of combat soldiers. He also volunteered as a coach in area high schools and played on the regimental baseball team. Following the war he returned to Glencoe as instructor in Boys Physical Education. Highlights of his tenure following the war include:

1946-47 Coaching two undefeated football teams with Joe Kostelic

1946- started a Tumbling Team for boys and girls that eventually became the Boys Gymnastic Team, which he coached until 1969.

1947- hired as the City of Glencoe's first Recreation Director. With the Recreation Committee, made plans for and saw the restoration of Oak Leaf Park as a recreation ground and restoration of the baseball diamond and construction of a permanent grandstand. Lighting for night games was added in 1948. (Played first base with the town baseball team during this period) Other permanent improvements to general recreation were also made.

1949- Started the Driver Education program. He was involved with different aspects of the program throughout his career.

1949- Began a second career as Square and Round Dance caller and teacher.

1950- Selected to work on the Governor's Statewide Conference on Youth, the results of which were published in book form. He was offered a position in the state education department but the Glencoe School Board refused to release him.

1952-53- Councilor at Camp Hiawatha (boys camp) in Grand Rapids, Mn.

1952- Began the Boys Wrestling program and coached it until a suitable coach was available on the faculty. It appears in the annuals for the first time as a varsity sport in 1954-55.

1955- Began the Firearms Safety Training program with George Laible.

1955-56- As city Recreation Director researched options for and made the recommendation to the city that a swimming pool should be constructed as there were no safe local options available for swimming instruction.

1957- Beginning this year organized and directed yearly summer square dance camps in the U.S. and Canada until the 1970's.

1958- Did not coach, but assisted in the establishment of a Boys Tennis Team.

1962- Did not coach, but assisted in the establishment of a Boys Golf Team.

1964- Served as President of the Minnesota State Square Dance Federation.

1965- Offered a special after school unit in gymnastics for any girl interested in trying gymnastics. (first actual girls gymnastic team started in 1967 by Janet Willand)

1967- Changed teaching assignment from Health and Physical Education to Junior High Social Studies where he remained until retiring in 1971.



Glencoe High School 1943 basketball team. The week after the season ended Jack reported for military duty and ended up at Camp Wheeler and Fort Benning, Georgia.



Glencoe High School: late 1940s.




GHS 1948 Tumbling Team. This group later became the boy's gymnastics team.




